

Following a BA from the College of Charleston and an MA from the University of South Carolina, Cooper was awarded a Ph.D. in philosophy from Rutgers University. After publishing philosophical works, such as *A Phenomenological Examination into the Intelligibility of Experience* (Ohio University Press, 1993), he turned to fiction, and his first novel, "Hume's Fork", appeared in 2007.

AHA supports the Do No Harm Act



When the "the Religious Freedom Restoration Act (RFRA) became law in 1993, no one expected that it would be used to allow religiously motivated discrimination against other Americans. Sadly, the religious right twisted this law to allow all sorts of religiously motivated bad behavior, which is why we were glad to see the Do No Harm Act introduced in the Senate this week. In fact, the AHA is so supportive of this new legislation that we are listed as an [official supporting organization](#) by the Senators who introduced the bill.

The Do No Harm Act would change RFRA by clarifying that it cannot counteract civil rights laws, employment law, protections against child abuse or access to health care. That means that RFRA would finally do what it was intended to do: protect the religious rights of all Americans while also protecting our civil rights and liberties.

Can you take a moment right now to ask your Senators to co-sponsor this important bill?

In order for this bill to become law we need to overcome opposition by the religious right in Congress, which means we need all humanists to take action on this important issue and contact your Senators. **Urge your Senators to co-sponsor the Do No Harm Act today!**



Scalise, Bishop aim for deal to open Florida's Gulf Coast waters for drilling

House Majority Whip Steve Scalise (R-La.) and Natural Resources Chairman Rob Bishop (R-Utah) are aiming to strike a deal to allow offshore drilling in the eastern Gulf of Mexico if the U.S. military and federal government sign off, but it remains uncertain if their effort can convince Florida lawmakers to drop their sharp opposition to oil exploration off the state's coasts.

On Wednesday, senior Interior and Defense officials briefed a working group of lawmakers from five Gulf Coast states who are seeking to expand energy exploration, according to Scalise's office and Bishop. And the Utah Republican says he plans to draft legislative language on offshore oil and gas drilling that he hopes to incorporate in either the National Defense Authorization Act H.R. 5515 (115) or a broad energy package H.R. 4239 (115).

"There are some areas where if there's sufficient agreement between Interior and Defense so it doesn't impact the military mission, they can work that out," Bishop told POLITICO. "You can put a moratorium [on drilling] but you give some flexibility, so depending on what the military actually needs there could be some development in some areas, which happen to be where the oil deposits actually are that [energy companies] want."

A spokesperson for Scalise confirmed he was part of the effort seeking a "constructive path forward" for offshore drilling in the eastern Gulf.

"In the briefing, both [Interior and Defense] agreed that with appropriate restrictions and proper coordination by the two departments, there are some areas in the federal waters of the eastern Gulf that could support both military and energy activities," the spokesperson said. "Whip Scalise looks forward to working with the Chairman and the other members of the working group on a path forward to ensure our military training exercises in the region are not compromised while also supporting the President's Energy Dominance strategy."

Several Republican sources said the issue has reached the secretarial level within the agencies — as well as the Oval Office. But one source familiar with negotiations said while they're moving in the right direction, they may not find agreement this year on how to handle the current moratorium that expires in 2022.

"The Florida guys are going to have to make a decision about what exactly they want," the source said. Some members of

the Florida delegation have voiced openness toward allowing some drilling in the region provided the agencies sign off on it, according to the source. And the interest in the eastern Gulf is likely to be mainly in deepwater areas rather than shallower waters close to shore.

"I don't think there's a chance there's going to be near-shore leasing," the source said.

Oil and gas leasing is prohibited within 125 miles of the Florida coast under a moratorium that runs to 2022. The state's congressional delegation and Republican Gov. Rick Scott have vocally opposed expanding drilling over concerns about impacts to the state's huge tourism industry as well as military operations there.

"Imagine resting on one of our white sand beaches, or swimming in our crystal-clear waters in sight of a farm of obtrusive white tanks full of oil, or having to watch large steel offshore supply vessels navigate and anchor nearby, crowding out our recreational and fishing boats," ten Florida House Republicans wrote February in the Tampa Bay Times. "The barges, workboats, tank farms, pipelines, mooring balls and other equipment that accompany offshore drilling and production are wholly incompatible with our tourism and residential economy."

Three Florida Republicans — Reps. Matt Gaetz, Francis Rooney and Gus Bilirakis — attended the Wednesday meeting with Deputy Interior Secretary David Bernhardt, acting Assistant Secretary for Land and Minerals Management Kate MacGregor and several Defense Department officials.

Why aren’t religious views classed as delusions?


Religious beliefs are typically incompatible with scientific evidence and observable reality, but aren’t considered to be delusions. Why not?

These ideas cover what an atheist is by definition, some generalizations that theists often indulge about atheists and atheism, and finally the most important thing one can know about an atheist. Understanding these ideas will give a clearer picture of what atheism really is and also what it really isn't. While there are many other things one could know about atheists and atheism, I feel these five things are the most important.”

"Humanism? What's that?"

The above quotation is nearly the precise response that one would get were he or she to ask anyone to consider becoming a humanist. People can benefit greatly from adopting a humanist position on every issue that involves them.

What humanism entails.

First, let's clarify our terms. Humanitarians and humanists are not necessarily one and the same. The terms are somewhat different. While humanitarians contribute to worthy causes, humanists are dedicated to the cause of humanity. That is, humanists want humans to become all that they can be, especially in a psychological sense.

Perhaps the greatest infringement upon your freedom is the society, or individual, that tries to tell you what to think and how to behave, and punishes you if you refuse to think and behave the way it (HE or SHE) wants you to.

Humanists want to know why they should think or behave a certain way. If they are given logical reasons they might buy the idea. If the reasons are not good ones they will likely choose to reject the ideas.

Take racism, for instance. After years of intense, in-depth research by scientists, biologists, anthropologists, geneticists and human behaviorists, it has been determined that, although people differ racially with respect to features

and pigmentation, there is no racial distinction in intelligence or behavior. The evidence in support of this position is easy to obtain.

Humanism fosters skepticism.

Of course, similar questions could be applied to the belief in the existence of a supreme being, astrology, reincarnation, ESP, homeopathy, mind-reading, or any belief. These ideas may or may not be true. A logical person, humanist or other, would wish to be certain that there is solid proof to support these, or any, ideas before making a major change in his or her life, in support of one of these concepts.

But, what about things that we already believe to be true, and for which we have never seen evidence? If you examined everything that you now believe to be true, how many of those ideas actually have proof to support them? The fact is that many of our beliefs have no valid support but we accept them simply because our par-ents, friends or, even our pastor told us that they were true. We have never been shown the proof. We have never asked for the proof. Someone whom we trust told us that they were true, and that was good enough for us. But should it have been?

Suppose that what we believe to be true is actually false. What difference would it make in our lives? The difference is that we would virtually be under the con-trol of another individual or group of individuals. We would be reduced to the position of sub-human, or robot, or slave, or child. We would, in effect, be ignorant because we would allow someone else to do our think-ing for us. The case could easily exist that we could allow a person to control our lives who is not as good as we, who hates us and who would like to destroy us. If a person whom we trusted told us that monsters were going to invade our house tomorrow, would we possibly vacate it immediately or even give it away — to the person who told us about the monsters? If some-one told us that we would have bad luck if a black cat crossed our path, or that we would get rich if we played

a certain number on the lottery, we might spend the rest of our lives avoiding black cats, or spending a small fortune playing the lottery.

Yet, the reasoning implicit in a well-grounded plan can free one from continued oppression. It can free one from fearing those things that shouldn't be feared and from being intimidated by those things that shouldn't be intimidating. It can motivate one to fearlessly take the strong and necessary steps to create his or her own destiny, instead of waiting for a mysterious, hopefully benevolent, force to do it for them.

What humanism can accomplish.

Humanism is little more than reason and common sense. It is the desire that a person has to believe only those things that have been proven true with empirical proof (the five senses) and logical thinking, and to fight for the right to live in a society that allows everyone to believe what he or she wants to believe as long as it doesn't infringe upon the rights of someone else who wants to do the same thing.

The very oppression of [Freethinkers and especially] African-Americans cries out for them to throw off the cloak of the supernatural which appears in the form of astrology, ESP, palmistry, theism and ghosts — and to throw off the fear and intimidation that accompany them. Freedom requires sound, logical thinking that removes the crutches of phenomena whose existence has never been proven. Humanism and its fearless logic can open the door to freethinking and freedom for all people, especially African-Americans.

Ahead of the Curve: Regulating Artificial Intelligence

I ran across a new report recently that made me do a double-take. "[When Software Rules: rule of Law in the Age of Artificial Intelligence](#)" was prepared by the Environmental Law Institute, and as the title implies it discusses the regulation of Artificial Intelligence (AI).



Environmental law and AI are two interesting fields, but what have they got to do with one another? Have the environmental lawyers run out of other ideas to work on, so they have to invade computer geeks' turf?

It turns out that AI has quite a bit to do with environmental concerns, for good and for ill. That's because AI has quite a bit to do with *everything*, and the environment is a subset of that. Or, turning it around, you could say the environment has to do with everything, and AI is a subset of that.

The report at its outset cites two specific examples of overlap. Cloud storage systems are wonderful, but they consume gobs of energy nearly two percent of all US electricity. So Google, which maintains some of the largest data centers, turned its "Deep Mind" AI system onto the problem of reducing its data center's energy use. The result was a 15 percent energy use reduction at what was already an efficient center.

Then there's the dark side. Everyone knows that Volkswagen figured out how to cheat on its emissions testing. What's less widely known is that they used AI to do it. By one estimate, Volkswagen's little AI trick may cause some [1,200 premature deaths](#) in Europe.

It would be helpful if the report recited a handy list of laws to pass in order to maximize the good that AI can do for humanity while minimizing the harm. Unfortunately, that isn't possible. AI itself is changing every day, and the "social contract" that society must informally adopt before hard rules are promulgated is nowhere near crystallizing.

One useful suggestion the report does raise is to port the concept of an "Environmental Impact Statement" (EIS) over to the world of AI. An EIS is required by law for major projects and takes an interdisciplinary approach to predict unintended consequences. A careful attempt to make such a prediction, expanded beyond purely physical concerns, could help decision makers cope with AI.

Example: an EIS for self-driving cars. On the one hand, there's reason to believe they can be more energy efficient, e.g. by reducing idling times and taking the most efficient route to a destination. They may someday become safer drivers than humans as well. All good—but what happens when people are freed from the annoyance of driving and are able to work productively during drive time instead? How many will be tempted to move even further away from their jobs, thus negating whatever positive effects there might be? An EIS isn't a magic talisman that can answer these questions definitively, but it's better to try to think them through in advance than just to lurch forward blindly.


I also separately ran across exactly the kind of danger we need to watch out for as we think through the challenges AI presents. One of the key recommendations in the Environmental Law Institute report favored "transparency," which in this context means requiring AI to be able to explain how it achieves a particular result. Not all AIs do this; as I described [last fall](#), the [AlphaGo](#) AI that beat the human champion at the game of "Go" makes decisions in a way that is impossible for humans to trace or understand.

The ELI report, and [many others](#) who have considered the issue, strongly recommend that all AI must be capable of explaining itself. "Black box" AI that produces an untraceable result should be verboten, if not by law then at least by social and industry standards of acceptability. Nevertheless, a recent *New York Times* [opinion piece](#) argued that "black box" AI is just fine, so long as it works, and the demand for explainability creates unnecessary friction and added cost. I thought the article was mildly persuasive—until I spotted the "About the Author" segment at the bottom, which noted that the author was a general partner in a venture capital firm.

I worked with venture capital pros during my legal career. They are incredibly smart, incredibly hard-working, incredibly selfish, and incredibly single-minded in their pursuit of rate of return. They have to be this way to survive, I suppose, and that's fine. They fill an important role in the economy. But they are the *last* people you want to listen to about the best way for humanity to deal with AI. I don't agree with the ELI folks on everything, but I can trust that they're trying to do their best for humanity as we deal with AI that is rapidly outstripping us. Venture capitalists? Not so much.


The single most important recommendation in the ELI list was also the fuzziest, calling on the public to "Raise awareness and foster critical thinking about potential applications and impacts of AI." AI is too big to leave to the experts, be they venture capitalists, think-tank lawyers, or tech geeks. The burden of critical thinking falls especially on humanists, because [relying on scripture](#) for guidance, as some theists do, cannot yield useful results.





A century before Caitlin Moran cautioned that **“cynicism scours through a culture like bleach, wiping out millions of small, seedling ideas,”** Roosevelt admonishes against **“that queer and cheap temptation”** to be cynical.

Carol Anderson's book ***White Rage: The Unspoken Truth of our Racial Divide*** was published a few months before Election Day but remains vitally relevant more than a year into the Trump presidency. In it, Anderson discusses how anger in black communities is hyper-visible, while **“white rage manages to be almost invisible [...which] distorts our understanding of the reality of race relations in this country.”**



In this book, the authors, Mann and Ornstein, track the rise of extremism in American politics that seems to be getting worse every day. Anderson says *It's Even Worse Than It Looks* “gave [her] an insight into where we are right now with the Republican Party, understanding how [it] moved from a governing party to a party of opposition ... which then didn't provide any kind of space for moderate Republicans.”

The Ten Commitments

Schools are responsible for developing literate and skilled human beings, but they also must be committed to helping their students develop good personal, social, and citizenship values. This ethical mission is an essential part of all education, public and private, elementary through high school and university. In a democratic and pluralist society, we believe that the values presented should be the moral foundation of education <http://cohe.humanistinstitute.org>

Altruism

Altruism is the unselfish concern for the welfare of others without expectation of reward, recognition, or return. Opportunities for acts of altruism are everywhere in the family, the classroom, the school, and the wider community. Think of examples of altruistic acts in your experience. What person-to-person and group projects, classroom and school-wide activities, and community service projects might you and your students undertake?

Caring for the World Around Us

Everyone can and ought to play a role in caring for the Earth and its inhabitants. We can directly experience the living things in our homes and neighborhoods like trees, flowers, birds, insects, and pets. Gradually we expand our neighborhood. We learn about deserts and oceans, rivers and forests, the wildlife around us and the wildlife elsewhere. We learn that we are dependent on each other, on the natural world, and all that lives in it for food and shelter, space and beauty.

Critical Thinking

We gain reliable knowledge because we are able to observe, report, experiment, and analyze what goes on around us. We also learn to raise questions that are clear and precise, to gather information, and to reason about the information we receive in a way that tests it for truthfulness, accuracy, and utility. From our earliest years we learn how to think and to share and challenge our ideas and the ideas of others, and consider their consequences. Practice asking "what next?" and "why?" and "how do I/you/we know that?"

Empathy

We human beings are capable of empathy, the ability to understand and enter imaginatively into another living being's feelings, the sad ones and the happy ones as well. Many of the personal relationships we have (in the family, among friends, between diverse individuals, and amid other living things) are made positive through empathy. With discussion and role-playing, we can learn how other people feel when they are sad or hurt or ignored, as well as when they experience great joys. We can use stories, anecdotes, and classroom events to help us nurture sensitivity to how our actions impact others.

Ethical Development

Questions of fairness, cooperation, and sharing are among the first moral issues we encounter in our ethical development as human beings. Ethical education is ongoing implicitly and explicitly in what is called the "hidden curriculum" that we experience through the media, the family, and the community. Ethics can be taught through discussion, role-playing, story telling, and other activities that improve analysis and decision-making regarding what's good and bad, right and wrong.

Global Awareness

We live in a world that is rich in cultural, social, and individual diversity, a world where interdependence is increasing rapidly so that events anywhere are more likely to have consequences everywhere. Much can be done to prepare the next generation for accepting the responsibility of global citizenship. Understanding can be gained regarding the many communities in which we live through history, anthropology, and biology. A linguistic, ethnic, and cultural diversity are present in the classroom and provide lessons of diversity and commonality. We help others reach understanding about the interconnectedness of the welfare of all humanity.

Humility

We must always remember that there's a lot we don't know about the universe. There's still so very much to learn. Science will help us. But sometimes scientists discover surprising things that tell us how some of our old beliefs are false. So we need to be willing to change when our knowledge changes. A good humanist doesn't try to be sure of things that science can't show are true.

Peace and Social Justice

A curriculum that values and fosters peace education would promote the human rights of all people and understanding among all nations, cultural and religious groups. Students should have opportunities to learn about the United Nations' role in preventing conflict as well as efforts to achieve social justice in the United States. They should learn about problems of injustice including what can be done to prevent and respond to these problems with meaningful actions that promote peace and social justice and that protect the inherent human rights of everyone both at home and abroad.

Responsibility

Our behavior is morally responsible when we tell the truth, help someone in trouble, and live up to promises we've made. Our behavior is legally responsible when we obey a just law and meet the requirements of membership or citizenship. But we also have a larger responsibility to be a caring member of our family, our community, and our world. Stories and role-playing can help students understand responsibility and its absence or failure. We learn from answering such questions as: What happens when we live in accordance with fair and just rules? What happens when we don't? What happens when the rules are unjust?

Service and Participation

Life's fulfillment can emerge from an individual's participation in the service of humane ideals. School-based service-learning combines community service objectives and learning objectives with the intent that the activities change both the recipient and the provider. It provides students with the ability to identify important issues in real-life situations. Through these efforts we learn that each of us can help meet the needs of others and of ourselves. Through our lifetime, we learn over and over again of our mutual dependence.



-- An ancient legend claimed that Jesus had a twin brother Thomas. An extra-Biblical text that dates from perhaps as early as the late first century CE (which would make it the same age as the Biblical Gospels) claimed to be the secret teachings of Jesus as recorded by "Judas Didymos Thomas." The Greek word "Didymos" and the Aramaic word "Thomas" both mean "twin."

While only several Greek fragments of this manuscript, dating to the early second century CE, actually exist, a manuscript written in Coptic from the fourth century was discovered in 1945. This "Gospel of Thomas" contains 114 purported sayings of Jesus, many of which resemble passages in the New Testament. Drawing upon years of extensive research in early Jewish and Christian history and recent work on the historical Jesus, acclaimed novelist Ron Cooper focuses on Thomas of Nazareth, old and bitter after years of self-imposed exile from his homeland, who returns to Jerusalem to write a book about his identical twin brother Jesus.

Disgusted by how others have perverted his brother's message, Thomas wants to set the record straight. But in doing so, he must try to unravel the enigma that was Jesus. Provocative, inventive, and sure to be controversial, "The Gospel of the Twin" draws upon scriptural and ancient, non-Biblical sources to present an imaginative version of the founding of Christianity through scenes of violence, tenderness, and mistaken identity that will change the way the world thinks about Jesus.

Art Bell: R.I.P. L-I-A-R

Legendary broadcaster Art Bell, creator and original host of the nightly four-hour “Coast to Coast A.M.” paranormal/conspiracy/superstition radio show, died fittingly on a Friday the 13th of this year. But it was on the night of May 25-26, 2001, that I had my 15 minutes of fame with his national audience of millions.

Bell’s guest for that portion of the program was Richard C. Hoagland, a semi-regular best known for his promotion of the imaginary manmade “Face on Mars.” My cover story in the November/December 2000 issue of *Skeptical Inquirer* magazine had left little to the imagination about Hoagland’s credibility, but it did warrant a follow-up column to address a few loose ends.

In discussing the content of that column, Bell declared, “As a matter of fact, one of Richard’s harshest critics, as well as mine and many others in this kind of business, would be my good friends at the *Skeptical Inquirer*. Well, Gary Posner of the *Skeptical Inquirer*, incredibly, in his May/June 2001 [follow-up column] said, quote, ‘Some have remarked that this version — a [1998] light-reversed Face on Mars photo — does indeed look a bit more like a head, though that of a lion rather than a humanoid. The idea, therefore, that Richard C. Hoagland should be ridiculed for stating that the new Face on Mars photo shows an eastern-side lion head, is ridiculous.’”

A bit later, Bell to Hoagland: “The *Skeptical Inquirer* never — almost never — retracts anything it ever says. And they noted, in their May/June edition, that indeed you should not be ridiculed for stating the new Face on Mars photo shows an eastern-side lion head. Uh, they actually went out of their way to say, in essence, that they would agree — they might agree. Well, they didn’t say that, but they said you shouldn’t be ridiculed . . .”

And while winding down, Hoagland summarized, “And the most amazing thing is Gary Posner’s reaction. I mean, the *Skeptical Inquirer* can never be considered a prejudiced source in favor of our model, right? For him to say that I shouldn’t be ridiculed for proposing this, I believe, and the reason they did the retraction, is they had an inside track . . . that there *is* a ‘Face’ on Mars, it *does* have dual [humanoid-lion] imagery, and we’re going to go there physically and find out what it means with a manned mission.”

Bell and Hoagland could not have conveyed more clearly to their listeners that my follow-up column contained a “retraction” of my cover story’s criticisms of Hoagland’s “Face on Mars” claims, that I was now of the opinion that to ridicule him for promulgating them would be “ridiculous,” and that my sudden about-face about the “Face” was likely due to newly acquired “inside” information confirming its reality.

The "Grotesque Caricature" of the White Evangelical is Real

Most are apoplectic about the [White Evangelical](#) durable and cultlike support for Donald Trump. Some see their current morality as a self-serving new thing to get the judges they want. The evil emanating from their movement is neither new nor should it be surprising. See [page 16](#) for an example

Hollis Phelps, Professor of Interdisciplinary studies at Mercer University in Macon, GA, wrote an [article](#) titled *Maybe It's Time to Admit that the 'Grotesque Caricature' of White Evangelicals is the Reality* where he examines the pathology. It is likely the best analysis of the reality of the evil that has always been a part of the sect. He wrote the following.

There's no doubt that evangelicalism seems to have an image problem, especially since its overwhelming alliance with Trump. In the minds of many outside the fold, evangelicalism no longer represents a specific religious position centered on sin and the need for individual salvation but rather a self-serving, power-hungry political movement that will side with the devil himself for the sake of political pragmatism.

"When people say what does it mean to be an evangelical, people don't say evangelism or the gospel," Birdsall told the Washington Post. But this image problem isn't new. Although polling shows that overall feelings toward evangelicals as a religious group have remained relatively stable since 2014, the perception of evangelicals as "agents of intolerance," to quote John McCain back in 2008, well predates the Trump era. And besides, we shouldn't chalk it all up to image. The fact remains that over 80% of self-identified white evangelical voters cast their lot with Trump. Moreover, despite a host of missteps and scandals, overall evangelical support for Trump as president hasn't declined but grown.

Phelps posits the pretext that the White Evangelical uses to support Donald Trump and turns it on its head.

Given the consistency with which white evangelicals as a whole have lent their support to Trump—and right-wing candidates and policies more generally—it's far past time to own up to the fact that the image is, in many respects, the reality.

Well-intentioned evangelical leaders may not like to hear that, but it remains the case that an overwhelming majority of evangelicals continue to support Trump and his policies. Sure, they may have issues with his moral

center, or lack thereof, but they're willing to overlook all this for the sake of political expediency, for promises of "religious freedom," and the hope of a judiciary stacked with conservative judges. This is because, at the end of the day, evangelicalism isn't really about personal values but, rather, social and political conversion and control.

Phelps reveals an inconvenient truth about the White Evangelical. Trump did not create the pathology. He is just their medium that is a reflection of them.

The Trump era, then, does not create a new problem for evangelicals and their image; it's simply casting a very bright light on what has always been there, at least for the past forty years or so. ... it's questionable the extent to which evangelicals ever held much moral authority in the first place. ... appealing to some "pure" form of the faith beyond its supposed political corruption—beyond the racism, xenophobia, nationalism, and the like that even critics of paper over—isn't the way to go.

Not only do such appeals represent little more than nostalgia-laden theological desires that have little to do with what goes on on the ground, but they also ignore the fact that the line between religion and politics is flimsy at best, if not entirely non-existent. Evangelicalism, in its current manifestation, isn't a religion that has been corrupted by its entry into politics but is, rather, a social movement that works through a specific type of politics. The substance of that politics has been clearly on display for some time now. Trump and his evangelical allies didn't invent it; they only exacerbated it.

It is important that your Evangelical relatives and friends read this. It just may give them pause as they examine their morality. Maybe they will begin to see what the rest of the world sees. Maybe they will realize the irreparable damage they are doing to Christianity.
