

Sir David Attenborough has warned that ... "The Garden of Eden is no more",

as he urged political and business leaders from around the world to make a renewed push to tackle climate change before the damage is irreparable.

Speaking at the start of the World Economic Forum (WEF) in Davos, Switzerland, the 92-year-old naturalist and broadcaster warned that human activity has taken the world into a new era, threatening to undermine civilization.

"I am quite literally from another age," Attenborough told an audience of business leaders, politicians and

other delegates. "I was born during the Holocene – the 12,000 [year] period of climatic stability that allowed humans to settle, farm, and create civilisations." That led to trade in ideas and goods, and made us the "globally connected species we are today".

That stability allowed businesses to grow, nations to co-operate and people to share ideas, Attenborough explained, before warning somberly: "In the space of my lifetime, all that has changed.

"The Holocene has ended. The Garden of Eden is no more. We have changed the world so much that scientists say we are in a new geological age: the Anthropocene, the age of humans," he declared.

In a stark warning to the world leaders and business chiefs flocking to the WEF this week, Attenborough warned that the only conditions that humans have known are changing fast.

"We need to move beyond guilt or blame, and get on with the practical tasks at hand."

A survey conducted before the WEF found that environmental threats are now the biggest danger to the global economy, and concern is mounting that cooperation between countries on the issue is breaking down. Attenborough admitted that even he has been surprised by the speed of the damage caused to the environment during his career making TV programs showing life on earth.

In response, Attenborough – recently voted Britain's most trustworthy celebrity – said humans must use their expert problem-solving skills. "If people can truly understand what is at stake, I believe they will give permission for business and governments to get on with the practical solutions," he told the WEF.

Get it right, he argued, and humans can create a world with clean air and water, unlimited energy and sustainable fish stocks, but only if decisive action is taken now.

"Over the next two years there will be United Nations decisions on climate change, sustainable development and a new deal for nature. Together these will form our species' plan for a route through the Anthropocene.

"What we do now, and in the next few years, will profoundly affect the next few thousand years," he added.

Speaking to journalists after his speech, Attenborough warned that economic models needed to change. "Growth is going to come to an end, either suddenly or in a controlled way," he explained, citing the old joke that anyone who thinks you can have infinite growth in finite circumstances is "either a madman or an economist".

Cheap and hostile is not the way to attract teachers in Florida

How unhappy are Florida teachers? Well, in Pinellas County they think it's more important to fight for classroom flexibility rather than getting a little closer to the national pay scale for teachers.

What is the issue in Pinellas County classrooms that have teachers unwilling to sign a union contract? The head of the teacher's association says pay is not the main problem - it is the working conditions imposed by various regulation. (Washington Post)

So teachers in Pinellas County are at somewhat of an impasse in contract negotiations.

For this type of news, the initial response is usually ho. Followed emphatically by hum.

It's true, this headline could not be less stunning. First of all, it's the nature of unions and management. It's also predictable in a state that views public schools as disdainfully as the politicians of Florida do.

So why fret about it this time?

Two reasons:

No. 1, this is not your typical salary dispute. The teachers are not raising a stink about a proposed 2.55 percent pay bump. While teachers have walked off the job in states across the nation this year to protest dwindling paychecks, the union in Pinellas is more concerned about bureaucratic demands.

No. 2, this is only nominally about teachers. At its heart, this dispute has more to do with you, your children and the neighborhood schools your taxes support.

What's really at issue is classroom autonomy.

For the better part of two decades, the know-it-alls in Tallahassee have made a crusade out of reforming schools. They've changed curriculum — repeatedly. They've demanded more standardized tests — and then demanded fewer. They've made a battle cry out of freedom and

innovation at charter schools while at the same time handcuffing the great majority of public schools.

The result is they've made schools less appealing to parents. And they've made the job less appealing to teachers.

"Just let teachers teach. It's the reason they get in the business. No one becomes a teacher because they have any illusion about getting rich," said Mike Gandolfo, president of the Pinellas Classroom Teachers Association. "The problem is they've taken all of the joy out of teaching. All (teachers) are being trained to do is teach what's on the tests, teach what's going to raise the school's test numbers.

"How about teaching kids what they need to get along in life? A kid can raise his hand and ask a perfectly legitimate question about the subject, but if it's not covered on the test the teacher isn't given the time to veer off in any other direction."

Although his teachers' association is at odds with the county concerning bureaucracy, time demands and other work conditions, Gandolfo says Pinellas has generally been better than most districts.

It's the blind adherence to Tallahassee's mandates that is causing problems. And those difficulties are not likely to get better anytime soon

Former House Speaker Richard Corcoran, who has championed a bevy of misguided reforms, is expected to be named the state's new education commissioner.

And incoming House Speaker Jose Oliva recently named Rep. Jennifer Sullivan, R-Mount Dora, to chair the chamber's education committee. As the Orlando Sentinel recently pointed out, Sullivan is a home-schooled, 27-year-old who has no degree and appears to have barely attended any college classes.

What qualifies her for one of the most powerful positions in state education?

Oh, I'm guessing the fact that she will do whatever party leadership tells her to do when it comes to diverting education funds into the hands of private operators.

Look, you have no obligation to empathize with teachers in this contract dispute in Pinellas County. They chose this profession, and they are free to leave if they no longer enjoy it.

But here's what you might care about:

There are more and more teacher vacancies, and that means classes are getting larger and larger. Experienced teachers have had enough, and there is no stampede of applicants to replace them.

Secularism And The True Meaning Of Religious Freedom

On January 16th we marked National Religious Freedom Day, a day when we see articles and TV talking heads from the religious right claiming that there is an attack on Christianity in this country, and using the opportunity to call for more state funding of their churches, and further special exemptions from the law for religious causes. But it is also a day that is important to the secular community, and one which we should seize as an opportunity to publicize the truth – that religious freedom as a value is one central to non-religious people, and one which must not be perverted and corrupted by those seeking to impose their religious views on the nation.

So why is religious freedom so important to the secular community? We should look first at the choice of today for this celebration. In 1786, on January 16, the Virginia General Assembly adopted Thomas Jefferson's seminal Virginia Statute for Religious Freedom. This landmark legislation guaranteed religious freedom for all, believers and nonbelievers, and was the precursor for the Establishment Clause of the First Amendment. Freedom is an inherently good thing. For internal matters such as religious belief, the government should have no role to play in mandating or promoting a particular view. As Jefferson himself said, "[I]t does me no injury for my neighbor to say there are twenty gods or no god. It neither picks my pocket nor breaks my leg."

The Founding Fathers, including both Jefferson and Madison, were well versed in the dangers of societies that restricted religious freedom. They were well aware of the history of Europe, and the devastation caused by the religiously motivated Thirty Years War that had recently engulfed the continent, causing over 8 million deaths. As such, when they put forward the First Amendment to the constitution, they enshrined both freedom of religion as well as complete government non-involvement in religion.

Where such a separation of church and state does not exist, the consequences are tragic. And very often it is non-believers who suffer the greatest consequences. The "crimes" of apostasy and blasphemy carry the death penalty in thirteen nations; in many others they carry prison sentences. Even where official government action is not taken against non-believers and atheists, religiously motivated mobs will deal out vigilante justice to those who dare speak against the majority religion. It was to help atheist bloggers and activists threatened by government and mob violence that CFI established its program Secular Rescue. That such a program is needed, in so many parts of the world, stands in stark testimony for the critical importance of religious freedom to the secular community.

So we celebrate and defend religious freedom. But the value that we support is true religious freedom, not the corruption of it put forward by the religious right. We support, for all people, the freedom to believe or not to believe; the freedom to worship or not worship. But religious fundamentalists are not satisfied with that freedom. They instead maintain that religious freedom involves the freedom to act on those beliefs, regardless of the harm caused to others, and regardless of the laws of the land.

In the secular community, we will defend the right of all people to their beliefs, whether we share them or not. But we will not support religious faith being used to harm others, nor does the constitution require or even permit that. We support the right of an individual to view, however mistakenly, homosexuality as an abomination, but this does not extend to businesses refusing to obey civil rights laws and denying service to LGBTQ individuals. A person may see contraception as a sin, but that does not grant them the right to refuse to fill a valid prescription for birth control pills, nor for a company to refuse to provide the insurance coverage the law requires. A sick person has the right to refuse scientific treatment, and instead to pray for recovery; where they refuse effective treatment to their children, however, it is not religious freedom but instead child abuse.

We in the secular community cherish religious freedom, and celebrate National Religious Freedom Day. We cherish the right to believe or not to believe; the right to worship or not worship. We defend those rights for all, free from government interference or influence. But religious freedom is a shield from government oppression, not a sword with which to restrict the rights and freedoms of others. Freedom of religion necessarily entails the right to freedom from religion. An America where people have true religious freedom is not only one where government neither endorses nor opposes any individual religion, but also one where the government neither endorses nor opposes the concept of religion over non-religion.

He also worked with mentally ill New Yorkers to ensure adequate provision of state resources enabling patients to leave institutions and safely and productively live in the community; represented hearing disabled citizens in their efforts to ensure local hospitals provided sign language interpreters as required by the Americans With Disabilities Act; and represented individuals in complaints of malpractice against the D.C. Metropolitan Police. When his firm closed, Nick moved to the non-profit sector and accepted a position with CFI. Aside from internal legal work for CFI, Nick has filed amicus briefs in the Hobby Lobby Supreme Court case and the Seventh Circuit challenge to unfair tax breaks given to housing allowances paid to religious ministers. Nick is always seeking cases in which CFI can involve itself, either as an amicus in an existing matter, or directly representing a plaintiff.

Sune Boye Riis was on a bike ride with his youngest son, enjoying the sun slanting over the fields and woodlands near their home north of Copenhagen, when it suddenly occurred to him that something about the experience was amiss. Specifically, something was missing.

It was summer. He was out in the country, moving fast. But strangely, he wasn't eating any bugs.

For a moment, Riis was transported to his childhood on the Danish island of Lolland, in the Baltic Sea. Back then, summer bike rides meant closing his mouth to cruise through thick clouds of insects, but inevitably he swallowed some anyway. When his parents took him driving, he remembered, the car's windshield was frequently so smeared with insect carcasses that you almost couldn't see through it. But all that seemed distant now. He couldn't recall the last time he needed to wash bugs from his windshield; he even wondered, vaguely, whether car manufacturers had invented some fancy new coating to keep off insects. But this absence, he now realized with some alarm, seemed to be all around him. Where had all those insects gone? And when? And why hadn't he noticed?

The reaction by police and civilians is instructive.





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



Throughout the 20th century this understanding of the right remained the predominant view. But working behind the scenes was the beginnings of the gun-rights movement

What defines an atheist issue?

We are adopting these ideas by American Atheists.


- Is a religion behind the issue?
- Is a religion trying to impose its belief on the public?
- If we had true separation of state and church would this issue go away?

If the answer to any of these questions is yes, then we have an atheist issue. Why does this matter? It broadens the definition of what is of concern to atheists. Once we heard these criteria, we realized our organization had been using these without ever formally making a decision to do so. Therefore we decided to formalize our definition to eliminate any confusion.

What is an effective structure for an atheist organization?

We will have 4 committees:

What does this mean to our friends and members? This gives us a clearer direction on how to organize our activities, giving you a clearer idea of how to be involved with the organization.



Why Do People Fall for Fake News?

Are they blinded by their political passions? Or are they just intellectually lazy?

What makes people susceptible to fake news and other forms of strategic misinformation? And what, if anything, can be done about it?

These questions have become more urgent in recent years, not least because of revelations about the Russian campaign to influence the 2016 United States presidential election by disseminating propaganda through social media platforms. In general, our political culture seems to be increasingly populated by people who espouse outlandish or demonstrably false claims that often align with their political ideology.

The good news is that psychologists and other social scientists are working hard to understand what prevents people from seeing through propaganda. The bad news is that there is not yet a consensus on the answer. Much of the debate among researchers falls into two opposing camps. One group claims that our ability to reason is hijacked by our partisan convictions: that is, we're prone to rationalization. The other group — to which the two of us belong — claims that the problem is that we often fail to exercise our critical faculties: that is, we're mentally lazy.

However, recent research suggests a silver lining to the dispute: Both camps appear to be capturing an aspect of the problem. Once we understand how much of the problem is a result of rationalization and how much a result of laziness, and as we learn more about which factor plays a role in what types of situations, we'll be better able to design policy solutions to help combat the problem.

The rationalization camp, which has gained considerable prominence in recent years, is built around a set of theories contending that when it comes to politically charged issues, people use their intellectual abilities to persuade themselves to believe what they want to be true rather than attempting to actually discover the truth. According to this view, political passions essentially make people unreason-able, even — indeed, especially — if they tend to be good at reasoning in other contexts. (Roughly: The smarter you are, the better you are at rationalizing.)

Some of the most striking evidence used to support this position comes from an influential 2012 study in which the law professor Dan Kahan and his colleagues found that the degree of political polarization on the issue of climate change was greater among people who scored higher on measures of science literary and numerical ability than it was among those who scored lower on these tests. Apparently, more "analytical" Democrats were better able to convince themselves that climate change was a problem, while more "analytical" Republicans were better able to convince themselves that climate change was not a problem. Professor Kahan has found similar results in, for example, studies about gun control in which he experimentally manipulated the partisan slant of information that participants were asked to assess.

The implications here are profound: Reasoning can exacerbate the problem, not provide the solution, when it comes to partisan disputes over facts. Further evidence cited in support of this of argument comes from a 2010 study by the political scientists Brendan Nyhan and Jason Reifler, who found that appending corrections to misleading claims in news articles can sometimes backfire: Not only did corrections fail to reduce misperceptions, but they also sometimes increased them. It seemed as if people who were ideologically inclined to believe a given falsehood worked so hard to come up with reasons that the correction was wrong that they came to believe the falsehood even more strongly.

But this "rationalization" account, though compelling in some contexts, does not strike us as the most natural or most common explanation of the human weakness for misinformation. We believe that people often just don't think critically enough about the information they encounter.

A great deal of research in cognitive psychology has shown that a little bit of reasoning goes a long way toward forming accurate beliefs. For example, people who think more analytically (those who are more likely to exercise their analytic skills and not just trust their "gut" response) are less superstitious, less likely to believe in conspiracy theories and less receptive to seemingly profound but actually empty assertions (like "Wholeness quiets infinite phenomena"). This body of evidence suggests that the main factor explaining the acceptance of fake news could be cognitive laziness, especially in the context of social media, where news items are often skimmed or merely glanced at.

Ethical Humanism

Ethical Humanism, also called Ethical Culture, is an evolving body of ideas that inspires Ethical Societies. Humanism is a progressive philosophy of life that, without supernaturalism, affirms our ability and responsibility to lead ethical lives of personal fulfillment that aspire to the greater good of humanity (Humanist Manifesto III). For Ethical Humanists, the ultimate religious questions are not about the existence of gods or an afterlife, but rather, "How can we create meaningfulness in this life?" and "How should we treat each other?" The American Ethical Union was founded in 1877 by Felix Adler in New York, and currently has over 30 member societies.


Every year we sponsor events as Darwin Day in February, Solstice day in December, and other activities all year long.

He is also hopeful that he can change hearts and minds during his trip to Davos, pointing out that some delegates have more power than a nation state. "The enormity of the problem has only just dawned on quite a lot of people ... Unless we sort ourselves out in the next decade or so we are dooming our children and our grandchildren to an appalling future."

Before he spoke, Attenborough received the Crystal award from the WEF for his work. Saudi Arabia's first female film-maker, Haifaa al-Mansour, and conductor Marin Alsop of the Baltimore Symphony were also honored for their work.

Keeping up with Jennifer... Thinking Freely Speaking Out

The right way to vent emotions

Dr. Leon Seltzer wrote a wonderful article about venting your emotions. Ways to do it so that you don't hurt others in the process.

What I like about his article is it is all about conscientiousness. You are considering how your behavior is affecting others and taking care to make sure you don't inadvertently cause harm to another person.



His advice - chose who to vent to carefully. Is this confidential - or not? What are your listener's limits? Don't overstep them.

Make it clear - you are venting and get their permission to vent to them before you start. They might be having a bad day themselves and not be capable of listening effectively in that moment.

Should you vent to the person who frustrated you? Well - one of the reasons to vent privately is to help let go of your frustration so that you can think rationally about what you want to accomplish.

What is the best tactic. How can you politely address the problem so they will listen. If you vent and attack - the likelihood of the person who frustrated you - listening - drops to close to zero. Venting to others can help you develop a strategy that might actually work to address the problem.

Do I succeed at this all the time? Nope. Do I need to take this advice from time to time? Yes. Recently - of course. Has the problem resolved? Nope. In fact, something happened today that was frustrating and unprofessional. But ... I am taking corrective action to minimize the problem while still responding in a professional way as much as possible.
